

QUESTION: In each of the following sentences a part or whole of the sentence is underlined. Beneath each sentence, four different ways of phrasing the underlined part are indicated, choose the best alternative.

Only a small audience turned out for a lecture in April 1972, at the London Congress of the British Institute of Radiology with the unpromising title: Computerized Axial Tomography.

OPTIONS:

- a) Only a small audience turned out for a lecture in April 1972, at the London Congress of the British Institute of Radiology with the unpromising title: Computerized Axial Tomography.
- b) At the London Congress of the British Institute of Radiology in April 1972, only a small audience turned out for a lecture with the unpromising title: Computerized Axial Tomography.
- c) Computerized Axial Tomography: an unpromising title for a lecture turned out only a small audience in April 1972 at the London Congress of the British Institute of Radiology.
- d) At the London Congress of the British Institute of Radiology the lecture with the unpromising title: in April 1972 turned out a small audience called Computerized Axial Tomography.

SOLUTION: Here the unpromising title 'Computerized Axial Tomography' seems to be of the British Institute of Radiology. In option (B), this ambiguity is done away with. (B) is the most concise and clear option.
